

Implementing Protections for Legally Protected Health Information How to Submit Implementation Updates – Information for Technology Vendors

September 22, 2025

Background

During the 2023 legislative session, the Maryland General Assembly passed Chapter 248 (Senate Bill 786) and Chapter 249 (House Bill 812), *Health - Reproductive Health Services - Protected Information and Insurance Requirements* (law). The law prohibits the disclosure of legally protected health information (LPHI) by electronic health network (EHN) and health information exchange (HIE) entities operating in the State (also referred to as technology vendors) with some exceptions. LPHI is defined under COMAR 10.11.08, *Abortion Care Disclosure*, and includes mifepristone data and related codes for abortion care; other sensitive health services may be added to the scope of LPHI, as determined by the Secretary of Health.

In June 2025, the Secretary approved five new diagnosis codes specific to gender-affirming care, based on a recommendation from the Protected Health Care Commission. Amendments to the regulations are anticipated to be finalized in Q1 2026. In the interim, nearly all technology vendors have expressed an intent to begin preparing for implementation of protections for the gender-affirming care codes concurrently with the regulatory process, as requested by the Chairs of the Senate Finance Committee and the House Health and Government Operations Committee.

The law tasks the Maryland Health Care Commission (MHCC) with ensuring that technology vendors implement the required technical capabilities to filter and restrict from disclosure LPHI. Existing EHN and HIE regulatory frameworks, COMAR 10.25.07, *Certification of Electronic Health Networks and Medical Care Electronic Claims Clearinghouses* and COMAR 10.25.18, *Health Information Exchanges: Privacy and Security of Protected Health Information*, support implementation of the law. Most technology vendors expect to have the technical capability to block the required codes by the end of 2025; however, more time is needed to restrict text-based (non-structured) LPHI and enable the exchange of LPHI with a specific treating provider when direct consent is obtained.

³ In December 2024, MHCC issued time-limited exemptions to select vendors. Please note, MHCC will consider the need to grant exemptions beyond 2025 on a case-by-case basis.



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¹ Exceptions include disclosure for the adjudication of claims and to a specific treating provider at the written request and with the consent of a patient or a parent or guardian of a patient.

 $^{^2}$ The MHCC adopted emergency regulations in February 2024 as required by the law. Final regulations were published in the May $3^{\rm rd}$ issue of the Maryland Register, with an effective date of May 13, 2024.
