


Background – Prior Telehealth Study

- ► The Maryland legislature passed the *Preserve Telehealth Access Act of 2021* (Act) during the 2021 legislative session
 - Prolongs telehealth coverage and payment through June 30, 2023, including services delivered using audio-only technology
 - Requires MHCC in collaboration with state agencies to study the impact of telehealth and develop recommendations on telehealth coverage and payment levels relative to in-person care
- The telehealth study yielded 15 recommendations as it relates to telehealth coverage, technology, payment levels and future study, terms in statute, and network adequacy
 - A Final Recommendations Report was submitted to the Senate Finance Committee and House Health and Government Operations (HGO) Committee

Prior Telehealth Study Activities









Purpose of Interstate Telehealth Workgroup

- The HGO Committee requested MHCC study the ways interstate telehealth can be expanded to allow State residents to use telehealth to receive health services from out-of-state practitioners
- Study must align with House Bill 670 Maryland Health Care Commission - Study on Expansion of Interstate Telehealth, which was withdrawn by bill sponsors during the 2022 session
- A final report detailing study finding recommendations for expanding interstate telehealth is due to the HGO Committee by December 1, 2023



Interstate Telehealth Study - Key Areas of Focus

- The interstate telehealth workgroup will discuss challenges and identify approaches that improve Marylanders' access to telehealth services from out-of-state practitioners while ensuring protections for patients and an adequate supply of Maryland practitioners
- Study scope:
 - How to address the health insurance coverage and medical liability issues associated with the use of out-of-state practitioners through telehealth?
 - Are interstate health compacts sufficient for expanding the use of interstate telehealth?
 - Whether Maryland should alter its licensure practitioner requirements to further the availability of telehealth services while continuing to protect patients and, if so, how?
 - What impact will promoting out-of-state telehealth have on Maryland practitioners?


